15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

In the academic year 2022-23, the college envisions evolving into a comprehensive multidisciplinary autonomous institute. To achieve this, an Institutional Development Plan has been created to introduce new disciplines that meet global needs. As a SWAYAM-NPTEL Local Chapter since 2019, the college continues to promote a variety of self-study courses across commerce, humanities, and science, encouraging multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary learning. We aim to further expand interdisciplinary research projects across fields like computer science, BBA, commerce, economics, botany, mathematics, polymer chemistry, and physics. The curriculum includes credit-based courses and projects focused on social service, environmental awareness, and value-based education, supporting inclusive and multidisciplinary education. Since 2019, the syllabus has been updated to include mandatory self-learning audit courses—one each semester for the first two years of undergraduate courses and one per semester for postgraduate courses. Students are also actively involved in outreach programs as part of their graduation requirements. To foster community engagement, each student participates in activities under NSS, Compulsory Social Service, Swachh Bharat, Student Initiative in Palliative Care, or Unnat Bharat Abhiyan, helping them connect with and contribute to the community.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

In the academic year 2022-23, our college is working proactively to meet the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) requirements set out in the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. As an affiliated college, we await the university's registration with ABC. Meanwhile, we are helping all students set up DigiLocker accounts, allowing them to store their certificates digitally and easily transfer their academic records to ABC once the university's registration is complete. Additionally, our institution proudly serves as a Local Chapter for major online learning platforms like Swayam and NPTEL.

This enables students to enroll in courses from prestigious national institutes that earn them credits. Each department also builds partnerships through Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) with other colleges and institutions in relevant fields. These collaborations allow knowledge exchange and access to shared resources, enhancing students' academic experiences and providing interdisciplinary learning opportunities. Our faculty members actively contribute to their disciplines by participating on Boards of Studies, helping create textbooks, and developing reading materials, online assignments, and assessments, all aimed at supporting effective Outcome-Based Education (OBE).

17.Skill development:

In the academic year 2022-23, the college is enhancing skill development through various certificate courses, life skills, and soft skills programs. Each department offers skill-focused certificate courses alongside regular classes, aiming to equip students with practical skills. These courses emphasize humanistic, ethical, constitutional, and universal values, helping students understand and apply principles like truth, peace, righteousness, non-violence, and scientific thinking. Tutors highlight the importance of values in real life, using audio-visual and print media to make learning engaging. The college aims to foster positive attitudes and values, including human ethics, citizenship, and scientific temperament, while also addressing important societal issues. Through a well-designed credit structure, the institution ensures that every student completes at least one certificate, life skill, or soft skill course before graduating, even though these courses do not carry credits per university guidelines. To connect theory with real-world applications, the college invites alumni skilled in various fields to share real-life insights with students, bridging the gap between academic knowledge and practical skills.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

In the academic year 2022-23, the college continues to integrate the Indian knowledge system into its curriculum through both offline and online courses, focusing on Indian languages and cultural heritage. Celebrations of campus rituals and festivals give students a deeper understanding of India's cultural richness. Events like Mother Tongue Day and Hindi Week promote linguistic diversity and appreciation for Indian literature. Additional classes are offered to students who select Hindi as a second language, enhancing their communication skills. The Economics curriculum, paired with History as a complementary course, emphasizes Indian heritage and culture,

including translated classical Indian literature. Regional language classics are also incorporated into relevant syllabi. Faculty training supports bilingual teaching, aligning with the Kerala government's bilingual guidelines. Field trips provide practical exposure to traditional knowledge; for example, Botany students visit tribal areas in Kerala to study traditional medicines, while Economics students learn about tribal uses of natural resources in healthcare. The college also offers workshops to improve teachers' linguistic, teaching methods, and ICT skills for effective bilingual instruction. All degree programs are taught in both Malayalam and English. Student-led arts festivals highlight traditional performances, preserving cultural practices and enhancing student engagement. The College Union organizes celebrations of national festivals and traditions to foster cultural understanding and unity among students. These initiatives aim to enrich students' education, deepening their appreciation for India's linguistic and cultural diversity.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

In the academic year 2022-23, the college continues to implement Outcome-Based Education (OBE), focusing on the skills, knowledge, and attitudes students should demonstrate upon completing their courses. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays an active role in ensuring OBE is effectively practiced on campus. Students are introduced to the OBE approach during admissions, orientation, and by course instructors throughout their studies. Program and course outcomes are also displayed on the college website for easy access. To assess learning outcomes, student progression to higher studies and placements is regularly monitored. Among the 48 faculty members, 24 have completed Faculty Development Programs (FDP) in OBE. Each department has at least one faculty member trained in OBE, ensuring consistent application across programs. Additionally, the college plans to conduct a hands-on workshop on OBE to further enhance faculty expertise in this approach.

20.Distance education/online education:

In the academic year 2022-23, our college is preparing to launch distance learning courses, utilizing our own skilled teachers. Currently, we offer several training programs to students within the college and plan to extend these programs once we receive government approval. We are incorporating technology to enhance teaching and learning. Through affiliations with NPTEL and SWAYAM, students can enroll in courses that supplement their studies or explore new areas of interest. Each department has a staff member responsible for helping students enroll in these courses, with subject experts on

hand to guide them. Computer labs are available for students to complete coursework and assignments. Additionally, students are encouraged to set up a 'Digilocker' account, which will be useful once the college integrates with the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) after university approval. Through collaborations with national initiatives like NPTEL and SWAYAM, students can also earn credits for online courses. Overall, the college remains dedicated to supporting learning by providing online course options from various universities, allowing students to learn flexibly, even while on campus.

Faculty members create structured lesson plans, documented in Teacher's Work Diaries, with progress monitored by department heads. To enhance learning, diverse teaching methods such as lectures, presentations, and interactive activities are utilized, fostering teamwork, responsibility, and student-teacher relationships. A Mentor-Mentee program supports students' emotional and academic growth.

Our curriculum integrates social and environmental issues, ensuring holistic education. All students participate in field projects or internships, gaining valuable practical experience. The IQAC collects feedback to inform ongoing improvements, while bridge courses, remedial coaching, and tutorials support diverse learner needs. Digital platforms like MOODLE, Zoom, and Google Meet facilitate accessible learning. Class representatives report issues, discussed monthly in department meetings for timely resolution. These initiatives have led to improved academic performance, stronger industry ties, and curriculum enhancement, demonstrating our commitment to empowering students for success in their fields through comprehensive support and innovative teaching.

1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Mar Thoma College Chungathara has proactively integrated diverse cross-cutting issues into its curriculum through a multifaceted approach. The institution identifies relevant themes within the affiliated university's curriculum and supplements them with value-

added courses, addressing critical issues such as professional ethics, gender, human values, environment, and sustainability. Furthermore, various departments, clubs, and forums - including the Women Development Cell, NSS, Nature Club, Innovation Club and Student Initiative in Palliative - organize awareness programs and workshops to foster understanding and engagement with these essential topics, promoting a holistic learning experience. Mandatory audit courses in professional competency (with plagiarism reports) are integral to postgraduate programs, whereas undergraduate programs comprise audit courses on gender studies, disaster management and intellectual property rights. The institution addresses cross-cutting issues through various other initiatives such as certificate courses, invited talks, monthly lecture series and committees focus on social concerns like grievance redressal and anti-ragging. Students' well-being is supported by a three-tier counselling system. The eco-friendly infrastructure includes rainwater harvesting and solar panels. NSS initiatives promote environmental awareness and gender sensitization through activities like orientation programmes, tree plantation drives, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, blood donation camps, plastic-free initiatives, energy conservation camps, palliative care works, anti-drug campaigns targeting tribal colonies and the local community surrounding the college.

Mar Thoma College Chungathara has always ensured student centric learning environment in all the departments. Institution focuses on individual student needs, their unique learning styles and engages them in the learning process.

Notable programs include:

- **Institutional Visits:** Students and Faculty members of Department of Physics visited prestigious research institutes such as Indian Institute of Technology (IIT), Delhi and Inter University Accelerator (IUAC) during 2022-23. Department of Botany has conducted field visits to Botanical Survey of India Coimbatore, Institute of Forest Genetics Tree Breeding Coimbatore and ICAR- Sugarcane Breeding Institute, Coimbatore
- **40 Plants for Ruby Jubilee:** Students of botany department has taken the initiative of planting and nurturing 40 plants in the campus.
- Department of Physics has conducted Experiential Lab Training for post graduate students to make them understand Circuit Analysis, Equipment Physics and Signal Processing
- Peer Teaching Learning is an integral part of institution's learning system. Department of Botany has organised 'Peer Leded Terrarium Making Workshop' and 'Peer Leded Documentary Session', as part of Elephant Day Celebration
- **AURORA Management Fest:** An inter collegiate management fest organised by Department of Business Administration encouraging critical thinking and problem solving
- Debates, Student's Seminars, Quiz Programmes, Manuscript Magazines, Group Discussions and Hands on Training sessions for promoting collaborative training and critical thinking among students

The committee operates on a three-tier system.

At the department level, students can first approach their subject tutors, for addressing their academic concerns. The Community Extension Programme 2022-23, organized by Mar Thoma College, Chungathara, as part of its Ruby Jubilee Celebrations, demonstrated a strong commitment to community development in collaboration with Chungathara Grama Panchayath, Kudumbasree Mission, and KILA. The program focused on a comprehensive family health survey across six wards to detect lifestyle diseases, kidney ailments, and cancer risks, resulting in a detailed family health database and blood group directory.

Workshops empowered women in entrepreneurship and sustainable practices like organic farming and water quality testing, promoting local economic growth. Career orientation programs were also conducted in collaboration with KILA, helping unemployed individuals

enhance employability and self-reliance. Additionally, a Community Extension Center was established on campus to support ongoing initiatives and serve as a hub for future community development programs.

The programme engaged 350 students and 40 faculty members, fostering a meaningful exchange of knowledge and resources. This initiative strengthened ties between the college and the community, making a lasting impact on the socio-economic conditions and health awareness in Chungathara Panchayath, benefiting both the community and students' holistic development.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The college provides essential infrastructure, including classrooms, laboratories, a botanical garden, a Network Resource Centre, and research rooms for efficient academic activities. Each department features ICT-enabled classrooms for technology-based learning. The well-equipped library, with an INFLIBNET facility, broadens the resource base. The UGC-sponsored Network Resource Centre enhances teaching and learning exposure. Addressing rural student backgrounds, the Mar Thoma Computer Academy, established in 1998, now serves as a Computer Lab for BSc Computer Science students.

The campus includes an air-conditioned audio-visual hall and a seminar hall for lectures, seminars, and cultural events. Facilities for e-content development are available, along with a mini-conference hall with ICT facilities. Laboratories in science departments support practical learning, with Botany and zoology labs featuring diverse specimens. The chemistry department has core and complementary labs, and practices green chemistry principles. Fire extinguishers, first aid kit and eye washing facility are available in the labs.

Department of Physics has a general lab with darkroom facility, Electronics lab, Post Graduate lab and computational lab.

The Language Lab utilizes iTell Orell Digital Language Lab software. The botanical garden houses a rich plant collection, arranged by utility. A Moodle LMS is in place for effective online knowledge management.

Mar Thoma College regularly updates its IT infrastructure to meet evolving educational needs. The campus features 250 Mbps internet, Wi-Fi in all academic departments and seminar halls, and essential IT tools such as LCD projectors, laptops, desktop computers, scanners, and printers. The administrative office is equipped with computers, Wi-Fi, and a multifunctional device for printing, scanning, and photocopying.

To improve network performance, the institution has replaced a part of the network with fibre optics and installed gigabit switches, enhancing speed and reliability. Wireless connectivity supports ICT-enabled teaching, and the college uses Embase Pro Suite (LMS) for attendance marking and other academic functions.

Regular maintenance ensures that defective accessories, such as keyboards and mice, are replaced promptly. K7 antivirus software is installed on all systems and is updated regularly for cybersecurity. The computers in the Physics, Computer Science, and Language labs are updated in line with syllabus changes.

The Network Resource Centre provides students with browsing, scanning, printing, and photocopying facilities, fostering a productive learning environment. The college conducts regular training programs to help staff use ICT tools effectively for teaching and administrative tasks.

In addition, the institution is committed to environmental sustainability by utilizing energy-efficient equipment and responsibly managing e-waste.

Departments within the institution submit diverse support facility requests to the Principal, with decisions reached through Staff Council discussions. High-expenditure proposals become part of the budget plan, finalized during Governing Council meetings. Laboratory maintenance is the responsibility of parent departments, audited annually, and equipped with safety measures. The computer and language labs are overseen by designated faculty, ensuring updated and functional systems. The Library Advisory Committee manages book acquisitions and annual stock verifications. Botanical and college gardens are maintained by the Botany department, employing a dedicated gardener. Hostel and Canteen Committees monitor conditions in respective areas, while the Seminar and Audio-Visual Halls are directly supervised by the college management. The Website Committee handles the college website, and another committee oversees the LMS Moodle platform. Physical Education manages sports facilities. Campus Wi-Fi is maintained by external service providers. Non-teaching staff oversees classroom maintenance, while specialized personnel, including electricians, computer technicians, plumbers, and carpenters, address specific needs. The management allocates budgetary provisions, executes Annual Maintenance Contracts, and consults technical experts for renovations. Major purchases are scrutinized by a purchase committee. Lastly, staffing includes two last grade and four part-time cleaning staff for campus cleanliness, demonstrating a comprehensive approach to infrastructure management.

6.3.5 - Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non- teaching staff

The institution implements an annual Self-Appraisal System for both teaching and non-teaching staff, fostering a culture of continuous evaluation and development. Teaching staff are subject to a Performance Appraisal System, following UGC regulations, as part of their eligibility for promotion. Faculty must meet the minimum API (Academic Performance Indicator) scores as per the UGC Career Advancement Scheme guidelines. Their assessment includes self-appraisal reports and student feedback, ensuring a comprehensive evaluation process.

For non-teaching staff, UGC regulations do not govern promotions. Instead, promotion eligibility is based on a minimum service period of 10 years, contingent on vacancies and adherence to government rules. Non-teaching staff are required to complete self-appraisals and are evaluated through departmental tests conducted by the Kerala Public Service Commission. Feedback is regularly collected, analyzed, and used to implement corrective measures for improvement.

To ensure high-quality teaching, feedback on courses coordinated by faculty is analyzed by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), and recommendations for improvement are made. Additionally, the Teachers Diary, Parent-Teacher Association (PTA), and Open Houses contribute to creating a supportive environment for performance appraisal for both teaching and non-teaching staff.

Participation in workshops and training sessions on topics such as IT, income tax, PFMS, KSR, and Egrantz is encouraged to enhance staff expertise. The institution prioritizes staff development and ensures a transparent, fair evaluation process, supporting career growth and overall professional development for all its employees.

The Principal and Bursar share the responsibility of overseeing management funds, under the supervision of the Managing Committee. UGC grants are allocated based on the recommendations of relevant committees, ensuring proper utilization. The PTA Executive Committee manages PTA funds, while the College Students' Union Fund is handled by the Principal, guided by the Staff Advisor.

Transparency is maintained through annual audits of management-provided funds, with audit reports submitted to the Sabha Mandalam for approval. The college uses computerized management accounts, maintained by dedicated staff. These accounts undergo an internal audit by a Chartered Accountant appointed by the Mar Thoma Church, followed by an external audit. Any recommendations from the audit are implemented by the Governing Council.

Funds from external sources, such as UGC, government, and university contributions, adhere to established standards. UGC funds are audited by a Chartered Accountant, with utilization certificates and reports submitted to the UGC for review. Government funds are externally audited by officials from the Directorate of Collegiate Education (DCE) and the Accountant General's (AG) Office.

This meticulous financial management process reflects the college's commitment to accountability, compliance, and transparency, ensuring efficient use of resources. It fosters trust and confidence within the college community, reinforcing the institution's dedication to ethical financial practices.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college prioritizes student education and character development through a systematically implemented strategic plan. Academic programs are administered annually, in alignment with IQAC strategies, where faculty members develop comprehensive teaching plans, activity schedules, and internal examination timetables. The teaching-learning process is subject to periodic reviews based on the academic calendar, internal examination results, and student feedback.

One key initiative of the IQAC is the teacher's diary, which meticulously records class details, test papers, assignments, and seminars. Solid Waste Management: Designated bins are placed across the campus to segregate food, paper, and plastic waste. Harithakarma Sena collects plastic waste for disposal. Incinerators are installed in restrooms and hostels so sanitary napkins can be disposed of safely. All campus events adhere to a strict Green Protocol, banning flex boards and promoting eco-friendly materials such as paper and cloth banners.

Liquid Waste Management: Wastewater from the canteen and handwashing facilities is efficiently directed to the gardens and underground pits, ensuring minimal environmental impact.

E-waste Management: The college maximizes the use of electronic devices, with minor repairs handled by staff and significant issues addressed by skilled technicians. A dedicated scrap collection room gathers electronic waste before handing it to an authorized dealer for disposal.

Biomedical Waste Management: During the COVID-19 pandemic, the college responsibly collected used masks, gloves, and face shields and sent them to Marthoma Mission Hospital for safe disposal.

Waste Recycling System: Biodegradable waste is converted into compost, and mulching is practised to enhance the campus's waste management efforts.

Hazardous Chemicals and Waste Management: Laboratory chemical waste is managed responsibly. Exhaust fans and fume hoods are used to remove harmful fumes, and strong acids and alkalis are neutralized before disposal.

The Community Extension Programme 2022-23, organized by Mar Thoma College, Chungathara, as part of its Ruby Jubilee Celebrations, demonstrated a strong commitment to community development in collaboration with Chungathara Grama Panchayath, Kudumbasree Mission, and KILA. The program focused on a comprehensive family health survey across six wards to detect lifestyle diseases, kidney ailments, and cancer risks, resulting in a detailed family health database and blood group directory.

Workshops empowered women in entrepreneurship and sustainable practices like organic farming and water quality testing, promoting local economic growth. Career orientation programs were also conducted in collaboration with KILA, helping unemployed individuals enhance employability and self-reliance. Additionally, a Community Extension Center was established on campus to support ongoing initiatives and serve as a hub for future community development programs.

The programme engaged 350 students and 40 faculty members, fostering a meaningful exchange of knowledge and resources. This initiative strengthened ties between the college and the community, making a lasting impact on the socio-economic conditions and health awareness in Chungathara Panchayath, benefiting both the community and students' holistic development.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The college provides essential infrastructure, including classrooms, laboratories, a botanical garden, a Network Resource Centre, and research rooms for efficient academic activities. Each department features ICT-enabled classrooms for technology-based learning. The well-equipped library, with an INFLIBNET facility, broadens the resource base. The UGC-sponsored Network Resource Centre enhances teaching and learning exposure. Addressing rural student backgrounds, the Mar Thoma Computer Academy, established in 1998, now serves as a Computer Lab for BSc Computer Science students.

The campus includes an air-conditioned audio-visual hall and a seminar hall for lectures, seminars, and cultural events. Facilities for e-content development are available, along with a mini-conference hall with ICT facilities. Laboratories in science departments support practical learning, with Botany and zoology labs featuring diverse specimens. The chemistry department has core and complementary labs, and practices green chemistry principles. Fire extinguishers, first aid kit and eye washing facility are available in the labs.

Department of Physics has a general lab with darkroom facility, Electronics lab, Post Graduate lab and computational lab.

The Language Lab utilizes iTell Orell Digital Language Lab software. The botanical garden houses a rich plant collection, arranged by utility. A Moodle LMS is in place for effective online knowledge management.

Mar Thoma College regularly updates its IT infrastructure to meet evolving educational needs. The campus features 250 Mbps internet, Wi-Fi in all academic departments and seminar halls, and essential IT tools such as LCD projectors, laptops, desktop computers, scanners, and printers. The administrative office is equipped with computers, Wi-Fi, and a multifunctional device for printing, scanning, and photocopying.

To improve network performance, the institution has replaced a part of the network with fibre optics and installed gigabit switches, enhancing speed and reliability. Wireless connectivity supports ICT-enabled teaching, and the college uses Embase Pro Suite (LMS) for attendance marking and other academic functions.

Regular maintenance ensures that defective accessories, such as keyboards and mice, are replaced promptly. K7 antivirus software is installed on all systems and is updated regularly for cybersecurity. The computers in the Physics, Computer Science, and Language labs are updated in line with syllabus changes.

The Network Resource Centre provides students with browsing, scanning, printing, and photocopying facilities, fostering a productive learning environment. The college conducts regular training programs to help staff use ICT tools effectively for teaching and administrative tasks.

In addition, the institution is committed to environmental sustainability by utilizing energy-efficient equipment and responsibly managing e-waste.

Departments within the institution submit diverse support facility requests to the Principal, with decisions reached through Staff Council discussions. High-expenditure proposals become part of the budget plan, finalized during Governing Council meetings. Laboratory maintenance is the responsibility of parent departments, audited annually, and equipped with safety measures. The computer and language labs are overseen by designated faculty, ensuring updated and functional systems. The Library Advisory Committee manages book acquisitions and annual stock verifications. Botanical and college gardens are maintained by the Botany department, employing a dedicated gardener. Hostel and Canteen Committees monitor conditions in respective areas, while the Seminar and Audio-Visual Halls are directly supervised by the college management. The Website Committee handles the college website, and another committee oversees the LMS Moodle platform. Physical Education manages sports facilities. Campus Wi-Fi is maintained by external service providers. Non-teaching staff oversees classroom maintenance, while specialized personnel, including electricians, computer technicians, plumbers, and carpenters, address specific needs. The management allocates budgetary provisions, executes Annual Maintenance Contracts, and consults technical experts for renovations. Major purchases are scrutinized by a purchase committee. Lastly, staffing includes two last grade and four part-time cleaning staff for campus cleanliness, demonstrating a comprehensive approach to infrastructure management.

6.1.2 - The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management.

The college follows a decentralized administrative and academic structure that promotes participative management. Its governance is overseen by a Governing Council, which comprises a chairman (Manager) and eleven members. The College Council, a statutory body, includes the Principal (who acts as chairman), heads of departments, and two nominated members from the teaching staff apart from superintendent and librarian. This council assists the Principal in managing the college's internal affairs.

Academic and administrative decisions are made by the Principal through consultation with both the Governing Council and College Council. Policy decisions are primarily shaped by the Governing Council. 6.3.5 - Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non- teaching staff

The institution implements an annual Self-Appraisal System for both teaching and non-teaching staff, fostering a culture of continuous evaluation and development. Teaching staff are subject to a Performance Appraisal System, following UGC regulations, as

part of their eligibility for promotion. Faculty must meet the minimum API (Academic Performance Indicator) scores as per the UGC Career Advancement Scheme guidelines. Their assessment includes self-appraisal reports and student feedback, ensuring a comprehensive evaluation process.

For non-teaching staff, UGC regulations do not govern promotions. Instead, promotion eligibility is based on a minimum service period of 10 years, contingent on vacancies and adherence to government rules. Non-teaching staff are required to complete self-appraisals and are evaluated through departmental tests conducted by the Kerala Public Service Commission. Feedback is regularly collected, analyzed, and used to implement corrective measures for improvement.

To ensure high-quality teaching, feedback on courses coordinated by faculty is analyzed by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), and recommendations for improvement are made. Additionally, the Teachers Diary, Parent-Teacher Association (PTA), and Open Houses contribute to creating a supportive environment for performance appraisal for both teaching and non-teaching staff.

Participation in workshops and training sessions on topics such as IT, income tax, PFMS, KSR, and Egrantz is encouraged to enhance staff expertise. The Principal and Bursar share the responsibility of overseeing management funds, under the supervision of the Managing Committee. UGC grants are allocated based on the recommendations of relevant committees, ensuring proper utilization. The PTA Executive Committee manages PTA funds, while the College Students' Union Fund is handled by the Principal, guided by the Staff Advisor.

Transparency is maintained through annual audits of management-provided funds, with audit reports submitted to the Sabha Mandalam for approval. The college uses computerized management accounts, maintained by dedicated staff. These accounts undergo an internal audit by a Chartered Accountant appointed by the Mar Thoma Church, followed by an external audit. Any recommendations from the audit are implemented by the Governing Council.

Funds from external sources, such as UGC, government, and university contributions, adhere to established standards. UGC funds are audited by a Chartered Accountant, with utilization certificates and reports submitted to the UGC for review. Government funds are externally audited by officials from the Directorate of Collegiate Education (DCE) and the Accountant General's (AG) Office.

This meticulous financial management process reflects the college's commitment to accountability, compliance, and transparency, ensuring efficient use of resources. It fosters trust and confidence within the college community, reinforcing the institution's dedication to ethical financial practices.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college prioritizes student education and character development through a systematically implemented strategic plan. Solid Waste Management: Designated bins are placed across the campus to segregate food, paper, and plastic waste. Harithakarma Sena collects plastic waste for disposal. Incinerators are installed in restrooms and hostels so sanitary napkins can be disposed of safely. All campus events adhere to a strict Green Protocol, banning flex boards and promoting eco-friendly materials such as paper and cloth banners.

Liquid Waste Management: Wastewater from the canteen and handwashing facilities is efficiently directed to the gardens and underground pits, ensuring minimal environmental impact.

E-waste Management: The college maximizes the use of electronic devices, with minor repairs handled by staff and significant issues addressed by skilled technicians. A dedicated scrap collection room gathers electronic waste before handing it to an authorized dealer for disposal.

Biomedical Waste Management: During the COVID-19 pandemic, the college responsibly collected used masks, gloves, and face shields and sent them to Marthoma Mission Hospital for safe disposal.

Waste Recycling System: Biodegradable waste is converted into compost, and mulching is practised to enhance the campus's waste management efforts.

Hazardous Chemicals and Waste Management: Laboratory chemical waste is managed responsibly. Exhaust fans and fume hoods are used to remove harmful fumes, and strong acids and alkalis are neutralized before disposal.
